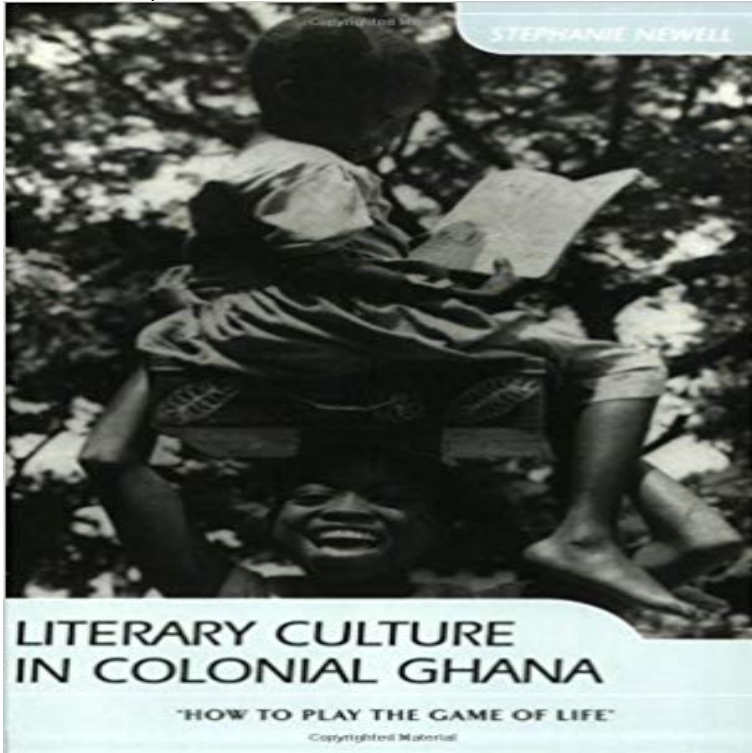


## Literary Culture in Colonial Ghana: How to Play the Game of Life
